The street address is 1037 Blagen Road in Arnold. It is between the Post Office and the Library on Blagen. To reach it you come up (or down) Hwy #4 into Arnold. When you reach the Chevron Station on the left hand side (coming up), you make a gentle left turn onto Blagen Road, which will take you past Ace Hardware and the Post Office. The Station is on the left hand side and is the big building full of Fire Engines if they are not out on a call. To park, drive to the right hand side of the building and into the parking area in the back. If all the spaces are full in the black top area use the gravel area to the right after you pass by the building. The building we use is in the back, with an entrance with a door--it's a classroom.

To find a folder you need, rather than drilling through nested folders, use the Finder's Go > Go To Folder. You don't even have to enter the full folder name. If you are manually entering a name in the go-to folder dialogue box, press tab to autocomplete the name.

Go To Folder is especially useful for surfacing hidden folders.
